### Workshop Schedule and Topics

Please Note: There will be an election training class provided by the Wisconsin Elections Commission on Monday afternoon from 2:30 p.m. until 4:45 p.m. Please indicate on the registration form if you plan to attend the Election Training so we can accurately gauge the number of attendees and plan accordingly. Workshops are scheduled for both Monday and Tuesday. Most have one hour time slots and will be repeated a second time. The Election Training workshop will last for two hours and will not be repeated.

## Monday: 11:00 a.m. - Noon (Repeated 1:15 p.m. - 2:15 p.m.)

**1. Solar Regulation and Best Practices:** Recent technological advancements and shifting energy priorities are causing significant increases in the construction of solar infrastructure. This presentation will examine state and local regulatory authority over solar facilities and provide guidance to successfully navigate solar infrastructure deployment in your community. Presented by WTA Legal Counsel Joe Ruth and Keith Ripp, Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation.

**2. Segregate Your Duties:** How can you work with your board to mitigate the risk of fraud and financial errors or misstatements? Come ready to brainstorm and plan a proper risk assessment of your organization and its current internal control framework. You will walk out of this session with action items to improve your internal control framework and with tools on how to discuss these action items and the whole process with your board. Learn how to work with your board to help them understand and make this evaluation a regular part of their policy review process. **3. Best Practices for Meeting Agendas and Minutes:** This session will discuss responsibility for drafting meeting agendas, communicating about what to include on an agenda, and suggestions for how detailed agenda items should be. Time will also be spent on agenda posting requirements, what to include and not include in meeting minutes, policies for getting minutes approved, amending minutes, and sharing draft and/or final copies of minutes with the public. 4. The Impact of a Rising Interest Rate Environment on Municipal Finance Decisions and Cash Management– the Good and the Bad: In the news you see reports of inflation, and Federal Fund Rate increases, but how does that impact your Town? You have important decisions to make that could impact facility improvements, project planning, and budgets. These decisions are directly impacted by interest rates and it is important that your Finance Team be aware of how a rising interest rate environment can have a good and bad impact on these financial decisions. # Monday 2:30 p.m. - 3:30 p.m. (Repeated 3:45 p.m. - 4:45 p.m.)

**1. Planning for Renewable Energy Systems:** Due to national and global efforts to reduce the dependency on fossil fuel consumption, renewable energy project developers are earnestly seeking acreage to site utility scale solar and wind projects, both in Wisconsin and across the nation. Rural towns with large tracts of undeveloped agricultural land are uniquely positioned to become the gateway communities to these large-scale renewable energy and sustainability projects, oftentimes with mixed resident support. Towns must be pro-active in their Future Land Use Plans to assess where renewable energy projects may be sited to be most advantageous to the Town, residents, and land. This session will discuss how towns can utilize land use planning to develop criteria that can help protect incompatible areas while identifying areas that could accommodate the multifaceted benefits of renewable energy. **2.** Aids for Town Roads Amidst Emergency/Natural Disaster: Floods, storms, and other disasters often wreak havoc on town infrastructure. Are you aware that there are aid programs available to help towns repair the damage and recover after disasters? This session will provide you with an overview of the WisDOT Disaster Damage Aid program, the FEMA Public Assistance program, and the Wisconsin Disaster Fund program and explain eligibility for assistance under these programs. **3. Building Broadband in a Rural Community:** Making broadband available to rural communities requires collaboration. Learn how Langlade County Economic Development has built public/private partnerships in order to continue to implement a community- wide broadband plan.
