Name Tags

Whether you are a registered town officer, spouse, or guest, your name tag is a very important item for your participation in the 2025 Wisconsin Towns Association Convention. It is your admission to convention functions. Please wear your name tag, as it identifies you as a registered attendee at the convention.

Phone Courtesy

We are all very busy and must occasionally take a phone call. Out of courtesy for other attendees, please put your cell phone on vibrate or silent during any program you attend. And, if you must take a call, please politely exit the room and have the conversation in the hallway.

Workshops & General Assembly

A map of the Convention Center is included in this material. General Assembly will be held on Monday morning at 8:30 am in the **Africa West Ballroom.** Workshops will be held in the breakout rooms in the adjacent corridors as listed in the following schedule. Most workshops are repeated except as identified in the schedule. Please take some time to acquaint yourself with the floor plan. Signs identifying the workshop name and room will be posted outside each room.

Exhibitor Area

The Exhibitors will have displays in the **Africa East Ballroom.** The displays will be open on Sunday afternoon from 1:00 pm to 6:00 pm and Monday from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm. We encourage all attendees to stop by the many commercial vendors and state government tables for information. On Sunday and Monday afternoon **Exhibitor Receptions** will be held in the Exhibitor Area. Coffee will be available from 8:00 am until 9:30 am on Monday morning in the Exhibitor Area and on Tuesday morning in the workshop area, sponsored by **Scott Construction.**

Sunday Afternoon and Evening

Convention attendees will have the opportunity to enjoy complimentary beer, soda, and snacks sponsored by **Rural Mutual Insurance** beginning at 1:00 pm while they visit with the exhibitors and watch the **Packer Game** on the big screen. Be sure to fill out the ticket in your registration envelope and deposit it in the box in the Exhibitor area *before* halftime. During halftime, we will be drawing winners for fun prizes and you must be present during the drawing to win! Enjoy dinner on your own Sunday evening. Stop by **Africa 10** at 7:30 pm if you are enrolled in **Clerk College** or are interested in learning more about it. Monday and Tuesday Breakfasts

On Monday, breakfast will be served in the General Assembly Area from 6:45 am to 7:45 am for those attendees who pre-registered for the buffet on their convention registration form. The cost for breakfast is \$33.00 per person and is <u>not</u> included in the general convention registration fee. Breakfast will include fresh cut fruit, muffins, breakfast breads, fruit-filled Danish, scrambled eggs, smoked bacon, turkey sausage links, breakfast potatoes, orange juice, apple juice, coffee, and tea. On Tuesday morning breakfast will be served from 7:00 am to 8:00 am as an optional event for \$33.00 per person for those attendees who pre-registered on their convention registration form. The breakfast will consist of freshcut fruit, muffins, breakfast breads, fruit-filled Danish, orange juice, apple juice, coffee, tea, scrambled eggs, smoked bacon, turkey sausage links, and roasted red bliss potatoes.

Monday and Tuesday Lunches

Lunch is provided on Monday and Tuesday to registered officers as part of their registration. Lunch is not included in the spouse or guest registration. Spouses and guests may purchase lunch tickets at a cost of \$20 per day at the registration desk. Lunch will be served in the General Assembly area. Monday's buffet lunch will feature roasted pork loin, vegetables, new potatoes and rolls. Tuesday's lunch will feature a build your own taco buffet with tortillas, ground beef, beans, lettuce, cheese, tomatoes, chips, salsa, and sour cream.

Monday Evening Banquet & Awards Program (Optional Event)

The Monday evening Banquet and Awards Program will include recognition of town and village officers who have served 30 years or more and have achieved a 5-year increment as was indicated on their convention registration. This is an optional banquet at a cost of \$45 per ticket and is not included in the registration fees for officers or spouses/guests. The dinner buffet will feature roasted chicken, pot roast, salad, chef's vegetable, starch, rolls, and a mini dessert buffet.

For those attendees who did not register for the banquet in advance, a limited number of tickets are available until Monday at 1:00 pm at the WTA Convention Registration area.



Town Advocacy Council Ambassador Program FAQ



Q. What is the Town Advocacy Council (TAC)?

A. The Town Advocacy Council is one of WTAs' most influential strategies. Founded in the 1980s, the TAC is a subsidiary of the Wisconsin Towns Association that has evolved over time. One of WTA's main purposes is to provide legislative advocacy in support of towns. The TAC is the primary instrument through which we accomplish this. In Addition to funding general legislative advocacy efforts, TAC investment helps pay for WTA's Capitol Day, the Local Government Institute, legislative listening sessions, and educational workshops. Please consider investment in the Town Advocacy Council as you prepare your 2026 budget!

Q. What is the TAC Ambassador Program?

A. Expanded legislative advocacy capacity stemming from increased investment in TAC by member towns and villages has put us in a position to take a new step forward in how we support and defend local government – the TAC Ambassador Program. This program will draw on a select group of engaged town officials from every legislative district who volunteer to develop a relationship with their state legislators and engage with those legislators on WTA's priorities. TAC Ambassadors will be on the front lines of our advocacy efforts and will receive regular educational opportunities to support their mission.

Q. What is required of TAC Ambassadors?

A. The time commitment for Ambassadors is not intended to be burdensome. We will hold a few virtual trainings and discussions throughout the year to provide Ambassadors with updates on specific legislative priorities. Ambassadors will then be expected to initiate a few short informal meetings or phone calls with their state legislators throughout the year to build relationships and discuss town issues. Travel to Madison will not be expected of Ambassadors, except that we strongly encourage all ambassadors to attend WTA's Capitol Day, held in the spring of odd numbered years.

New TAC Ambassadors will be provided with all of the training and information necessary for their success. That training will include an overview of current legislative priorities, a description of Wisconsin's legislative process, and tips for engaging with legislators on the issues. The primary goal of this program is simply to develop relationships with legislators and have discussions about local issues. We firmly believe that good communication and active relationships between local and state officials is necessary for effective governance.





• Test & Learn: Shift your mindset to one of experimentation and continuous improvement—because even Mr. Beast started with zero subscribers. Social media success comes from a smart, iterative process.

2. Lights, Camera, Action!

We'll get hands-on by filming some content. Sam will challenge members of the workshop to create their very own short, authentic video in the room - highlighting their work. Uncomfortable on camera? This process will help unblock those natural jitters? Think it's too hard? Sam will show you how small tweaks and tools (like the free CapCut app) can turn quick clips into ready-made social content in just a few minutes!

3. Turning Engagement into Opportunity

This portion is almost like group-therapy. We'll work through participants real-life examples of challenging social media comments and community group conversations. Learn how to spot the feedback worth acting on, avoid the "STP" (Same Ten People) trap, and keep social media from dominating your life and ruining your day!

4. Defining Your Voice

Your voice sets the tone for how your community experiences you online. Together, we'll create a voice profile for one lucky volunteer—live in the session—so you learn a process the process on defining the core of your own communications presence on social media.


